

Suspects Charged in Nail Salon Burglary

Update

The Huntley Police Department filed charges Sunday evening against three suspects alleging their involvement in the May 15th burglary of Julie's Nail Salon located at 10428 Rt. 47.

Officers from the Huntley Police Department were conducting surveillance on Julie's Nails at the time of the burglary. It is being alleged that Jameil D. Houser age 25 and Xavier S. Oaks age 22 broke out the front window to the Nail Salon and entered with the intent to commit theft. As officers approached the front of the business both Houser and Oaks fled from the business out the rear door to the alley in the back of the shopping center. It was in the alley where Houser and Oaks were confronted by officers and attempt to run on foot. Officers were able to apprehend Houser without incident in the parking lot of an apartment complex in the 10400 block of Church St directly east of the shopping center. Oaks was able to elude officers until he was taken into custody without incident walking on Main St near Rt 47. Michelle Seawood age 26 was taken into custody while sitting in a parked 2002 Mercury Sable which was in the parking lot of the apartment complex.

This is the third time since March that Julie's Nail Salon has been the victim of a burglary. Huntley Police Detectives continued to investigate this incident and after reviewing evidence were able to charge Houser and Seawood with the April 21, 2011 burglary at Julie's Nail Salon. The March 12, 2011 burglary is still under investigation.
